Curling in Kent

The sport has a home in England, at Tunbridge Wells - and is showing signs of establishing a strong foothold. The editor has heard about two different styles of bonspiel - both designed to get people to know each other.

A) Four sheets - eight rinks.
 Play ends on each sheet,

- moving from position to position, to allow a turn at all four. Each person has an individual scorecard comprising the scores of the ends played, in whatever position.
- B) Target curling all shots count after the final stone has been laid in on end. 5 for a centre stone, 4 for a full stone in the white. 3 in or touching the inside of the 12 ft circle, 2 touching the 12 ft circle and 1 beyond the hog line.

 Apparently it helps to play different teams as the strategy can vary a great deal.

Overheard at Lockerbie - 'I'm not totally against women in Inverkeithing Curling Club - it would be one way to make up the numbers - Peter Ritchie



Time keeping on the ice

How often do you get frustrated at playing only seven ends – bet you are thinking it is the other team, or the skip? A useful article in Scottish Curler (January 2005) highlighted this point, and in the interest of improving the amount of playing time the ideas are shared here.

- 1. Be ready to start play at the time allotted how many times are players still in the bar!
- 2. When an end is complete let the lead be ready to play his stone teammates can order the other stones.
- 3. If you use a slider have it ready when you need it!
- 4. Skips be ready to play take as much time as required to select a shot but don't let the team fall asleep.
- 5. Committees are time consuming


