
The season is almost half way through - a good one by anyone' standards. Hope the enthusiasm last through the excesses of the Festive season.

Gardening tips

Many of my fellow curlers may not realise that I am a keen keen gardener and therefore a dab hand with the hoe and chainsaw. So I am taking this opportunity to share some of my trade secrets with you.

Let's start with he common onion (Jimous Riginermus). make sure you plant them, at least 3 - 4 metres apart. This is known as the longwalk method. Another favourite is the old cabbage (Jonus Tibertet). This one needs lots of feeding but not a lot of water and must be kept in a warm spot. It can also be varied in appearance.

Then you have the top of the range the carrot (Tominus Clarkitoid). Now this has a vigorous top growth, very bushy. Although it needs very little feeding stand it in sand and it will soak up water and additives you can throw at it.

Now we come to the mushroom(Bilious Broonnot). It may be classified as something to be avoided - but it is in fact a fungi. To conclude it has to be said my real love is the common flower the pansy - I'm sure I do not need to tell you about pansies.
